### JHS Teachers and Principals focus on Visible Learning

JHS teachers and principals are setting priorities for the second semester of 2014-15 with a renewed emphasis on *Visible Learning* principles. In his book, *Visible Learning for Teachers: Maximizing Impact on Learning,* author John Hattie outlines years of research in which a statistical analysis of "effect sizes" are used to determine optimal growth for student achievement, as a result of strategies used by teachers in the classroom.

Essentially one year of growth for students can be measured by using pre and post-tests for students and often times can be attributed to a particular strategy used frequently in the classroom. An effect size of .40 or higher generally means the strategy is useful in making a difference in learning. And an effect size of 1.0 or greater is generally equivalent to one year's growth toward achievement gains. The second semester of 2014-15 will be marked by a renewed emphasis on three fundamentally sound strategies that have high effect sizes for student achievement gains. They are, an emphasis on: teacher feedback to the student (effect size of .73), student self-regulated learning (effect size of 1.44), and teacher clarity for the objective for learning (effect size of .75).

Over the course of the spring semester and next school year JHS teachers and principals will be engaged in additional professional development activities and review of lesson planning strategies and observation to enhance the use of these strategies.

Marion William Dial was honored with the naming of the entry and first floor in C Hall of Joplin High School. Dial was born in 1903 in Chetopa, Kansas. Dial attended Kansas State Teacher's College in Pittsburg, Kansas (now Pittsburg State University).

Dial taught and coached basketball at Lincoln High

School for one year before he was named principal of the school in 1933. During his tenure as principal, Dial continued to coach basketball, helping lead the team to numerous state championships. After the integration of schools in1955, Lincoln School was converted to a special education facility. Dial remained as principal of Lincoln until his retirement in 1968.
